Reconciliation- First Steps on the Journey

The Mohawk words "Akwe Nia'Tetewa:neren" (in English, "All My Relations") were added to The United Church of Canada's crest in 2012, recognizing that we are all connected to each other and all of creation. Over the next year the Outreach Task Group will be looking for ways that we as a congregation can learn more about the work of relationship building with Indigenous brothers and sisters.

Our initial activities include: -

Indian Horse- Let's go to a movie! Based on the novel by Canadian writer Richard Wagamese, this movie centres on Saul Indian Horse, a First Nations boy who survives the residential school system and grows up to become a star hockey player. It follows Saul on his journey to self-awareness and self-acceptance. After we have seen the movie, we will chat about what we have learned following worship on June 3.

The Education of Augie Merasty- copies of this slim autobiographical book will be available to borrow at the church through the Regina Public Library's Book Club service in early September. Our "book club" will convene following church on September 28.



Westminster World Market- Our 4th market will be on June 9 from 10am - 2pm! New folks are planning to participate from Mauritius and Haiti. Our last market on March 24 featured two new countries (Nepal and the Philippines). Vendors at 28 tables sold food and crafts from places as diverse as Brazil and Pakistan. We were featured on both CTV and Global News. More than \$750 was raised through donations at the door for our Refugee Fund.

Rummage Sales and Westminster United Church - Elaine Andreas

I have been attending Westminster United Church for fifteen plus years, and over this time have watched, twice a year, as massive amounts of goods come in as donations to be sold at either the spring or fall sale. Traditionally, these sales have been organized by the Anniversary Unit, and as a member of that group, I am now involved in organizing these sales.



There have been a few changes over the years, - we no longer accept large pieces of furniture, clothing or sports/exercise equipment. But, by and large, the same routine has been followed; goods came in from time to time and were stored in our 'Rummage Room', and then on the Friday of the sale weekend, an army of volunteers moved the 'stuff' out of storage and into the Fellowship Hall, where another group unpacked, sorted, displayed and priced the articles. The sale didn't begin until Saturday morning and by one o'clock it was over!

This year, because of questions raised by some of the Friday volunteers about the short 'selling' time, we took a risk and opened the doors on Friday from 4:00 to 8:00 pm. We had huge crowds on Friday and took in over \$1900.00! There was some disappointment by the shoppers because we had opted not to sell baking on Friday evening, but it was a very successful evening. On Saturday, however, our crowds were much smaller than usual, so the selling, even of the baking, was slower. And the Coffee Bar had fewer customers, but we still took in over \$1600.00. The profit from the two days was about \$1100.00 more than last year's spring sale, so it was well worth the risk we had taken!

Now the question is, do we continue with the two selling periods or go back to one? Certainly, from a financial point of view, it would seem that we should continue with the Friday sale. But if we do, will the donations of goods continue at the current level so that the tables are not too depleted for the Saturday sale? And, would we have enough baking donated to fill the 'bake table' on Friday as well as on Saturday? And what about volunteers? Many worked Friday morning, and then again at both Friday and Saturday sales, which some found to be very tiring. Are there additional helpers out there?

The Anniversary Unit has asked those who participated to provide feedback, and indeed, we would welcome all comments or suggestions. These are excellent fundraisers, and they will continue, but we want to them to be GREAT!

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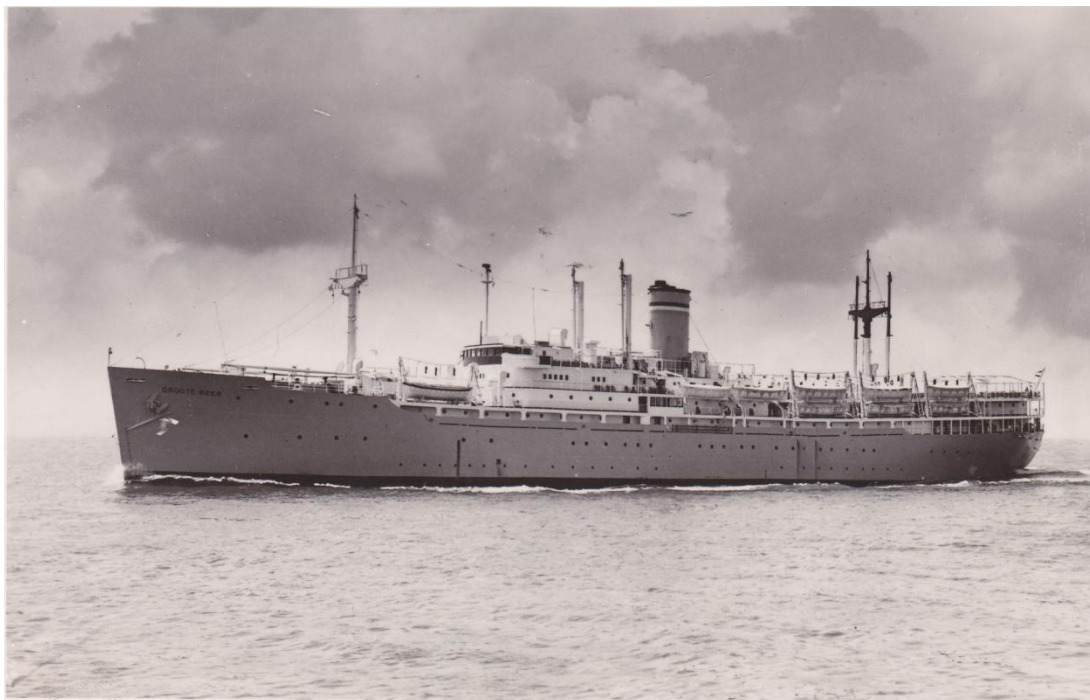

SS Groote Beer

Sixty-five years ago.

The SS Groote Beer played an important role in our lives. We set our wedding date when we knew its departure date and it transported us to Canada to an unknown future.

We, Johanna and Dirk Hoogeveen were married in Dirk's hometown Bleiswijk on the 18th of February 1953. As a newly married couple we immigrated on the SS Groote Beer to Canada. As we had no children we were accommodated in adjacent dormitories, one for women and one for men, each accommodating 54 persons.

The ship departed from Rotterdam at 4:30 pm on Thursday the 19th of March and we entered Pier 21 in Halifax at 6:00 pm on Saturday the 28th of March.

We continued by CN immigrant train departing Pier 21 at 1:00 am on Sunday the 29th of March and arrived at Union Station in Regina at 8:15 am on Wednesday the 1st of April.

We had travelled 9508 km, 5248 km by ship and 4260 km by train. The journey lasted 304 hours or just over 12 days and 13 nights.

Dirk found a job on the 1st of April and on Sunday the 5th of April we moved into rooms at 3026-13th Ave, right across from Westminster United Church. We attended WUC regularly starting on the third Sunday of that month.

The RCMP did not have its own chapel then and on Sunday morning two troops of Mounties, in red uniform, would come marching down 13th Ave and the Roman Catholic troop would enter the Cathedral and the Protestant troop would enter Westminster United Church, where they occupied two or three middle front rows. Not only would they give colour to the full church, but they also would add a male choir to the singing. We would sit on the back balcony then.

The Bully In The Building – Bullying Workshop

Westminster had the role of hosting this workshop in March with the Anniversary Unit catering lunch and snacks. Three people from WUC attended: Graham Bradley, Marilyn Hadwen and Darrell Reine.

It was a workshop for M&P Committee members, Pastoral Charge Governance Leaders, and Ministry Personnel. The Workshop Description: Most people would believe that in the Church we must love all people, regardless of their personality type. In reality, our strength is quickly drained when we encounter relationships that are tough and involve a bullying dynamic. Is there a way to manage these relationships well? What does love for our neighbour look like when we encounter actions that constitute bullying? What example has Jesus set for us in this regard? This workshop addressed these themes with candour and grace. Included: an overview of the new UCC Workplace Violence and Harassment Policy, July 2017. The Workshop Facilitator was Betty Pries, who is a highly regarded Conflict, Change, and Leadership Specialist with more than 20 years' experience coaching, mediating, training, and consulting.

Report from Council - From the Eyes of the Chair

When I was asked to submit a report from Council for this newsletter it was suggested that I could write about the highlights of what Council has been doing for the past few months. I thought about that for a bit and half-jokingly responded that there were NO highlights. Council's work over the past few months has been fairly hum drum, dealing with the day-to-day affairs of Westminster with no big things that stood out - in my mind at least.

So that's my report - business as usual, same again - same again, no news is good news!

Then I reflected a bit more on what I had jokingly said. And two more notions came to mind:

First I thought, no news really IS good news. This means that things are going along fairly well at Westminster. If Council has no fusses, controversies or big issues to deal with then it seems to me that there probably aren't any - at this time at least - and that IS good news. Overall, Westminster is a happy, stable, productive, faith filled, hope driven congregation of good souls. It doesn't get much better than that! To tweak the Gershwin brother's words 'We got starlight, we got sweet dreams, we got each other. Who could ask for anything more?'

Secondly I thought, it's not really true that its been all day-to-day and there are no highlights to report. Here are a couple:

We have two sexual abuse officers here at Westminster. They are Arlee Deschene and Susan Graham. Maybe you didn't know we have sexual abuse officers - to me, not knowing this could be an indication of good things. I sincerely hope, and I know Arlee and Susan hope, that the need to call upon them in their roles of sexual abuse officers never, ever arises at Westminster.

Nevertheless, Arlee and Susan recently attended a workshop in Saskatoon to better understand their roles and what they would need to do in the event they were called upon in that role. The official position of the United Church of Canada, and by extension Westminster, is: *We will not tolerate and will seek to eradicate any behaviour by our members, lay and ministry, adherents or employees that constitutes sexual misconduct or child abuse.*

On behalf of Council I would like to thank Arlee and Susan for taking on the role of sexual abuse officers, and for taking some of their personal time and trouble to attend this workshop in Saskatoon. And I would like to re-emphasize my hope that we never have cause to call upon them in that role. But I am very thankful that we have a process and people who understand it and could follow it - God forbid, should we need to.

Another piece of good news is that Council recently had the pleasure to nominate Kathy Tice as Chair of the Worship Committee. Worship Committee is responsible, through collaborative

work with the minister and staff, to ensure services and sacraments are planned, prepared and delivered so that they are meaningful and appropriate in the context of the theology and practise of the United Church of Canada. And although the Worship Committee has been without a formal Chair for a couple of years, Bev McDougald has graciously and capably fulfilled that role on an acting basis - and on behalf of Council I would like to thank Bev for all she has done and continues to do on Worship Committee and in many other ways around Westminster.

Along with Bev, Darline Artemchuk, Velda Back, Doug Bradford and Jordana Buchan have served many years on Worship Committee. Their faith filled dedication, along with our minister and staff has ensured our worship experiences are the best we can humanly achieve. And Council, and I am sure all of us, look forward to the ways that we will benefit from the life experiences, faith background and humble willingness to serve that Kathy Tice and two other newly nominated members to Worship Committee - Audrey Forrest and Clark Schaufele - bring.

To sum up and thinking back to my initial jokingly made comment that there isn't much to report - what I have reported seems to prove the benefit of taking time and standing back from the forest. In this case stepping back from what looks like every other day at Westminster and realizing there are a lot of small things that make the whole picture. A forest is made of many trees - our Westminster forest has many deeply rooted, strong trees!
